

FOREWORD

This Christmas Novena in Chant is an English translation and adaptation of a Latin original composed by Father Charles Vachetta, C.M., in 1721. Fr. Vachetta's novena became very popular in Northern Italy, where it was composed, and quickly spread to other parts of the world. Eventually, several slightly varying versions appeared. In making this English edition, the translators used a Latin version according to the Editio Vaticana.

Most of the materials found in the Christmas novena were originally taken from the liturgy of Advent, from the Roman Breviary and Missal. Ultimately, however, most of the materials in the breviary and missal were themselves taken from the Sacred Scriptures.

The rite or ceremonial of the novena varies according to local custom. One practice is to follow basically the rules for the singing of Vespers. The priest presides at the sedilia, goes to the pulpit for the Scripture Reading or Sermonette, and incenses the altar at the Magnificat. The service is then concluded with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Another practice is to expose the Blessed Sacrament at the beginning of the service, sing the novena, and conclude with Benediction.

In our age, when the festival of Christmas has been overcommercialized and paganized, this *Christmas Novena in Chant* will help the faithful to prepare spiritually for the coming of Christ. Furthermore, the scriptural character of the novena service will deepen their knowledge and appreciation of Christ, the central, dominant figure in the Scriptures.
